Results are in from the Master Gardener Foundation of King County 2024 Fall Appeal fundraising event, "Building Community."

- 611 King County
 Extension Master
 Gardeners (KCMGs)
 completed certification in 2024—a 95% return rate
- KCMGs staffed 48 outreach clinics—28 more than in 2023
- Our volunteers served 31,652 hours
- KCMGs served 16,663 people at 735 events
- We donated 4,477 pounds of produce in 2024, plus 165 plant starts

We received generous donations from 81 Extension Master Gardeners and Foundation members totaling \$15,389 to support the King County Extension Master Gardener Program!

The total amount of all donations received through our 2024 spring and fall campaigns is \$34,182, which closely matches our 2024 goal for development.

Thank you to all our donors for your investment in the future of the program.

Seeking Candidates for the Master Gardener Foundation Board of Directors

The Master Gardener Foundation of King County is seeking qualified members to run for election to its Board of Directors for the 2025-28 term. We are especially interested in candidates with experience in nonprofit fundraising, finance, and administration.

The Foundation is a separate, nonprofit entity whose mission is raising funds to support the activities of the WSU Extension King County Master Gardener Program. While portions of the Program's funding come from the US Department of Agriculture, Washington State University, and King County, the Foundation funds more than half of the Program's annual budget, including the cost of materials and supplies for plant clinics, demonstration gardens, and educational offerings. We could not continue many of our current Program activities without the Foundation's ongoing financial support.

Directors are elected for three-year terms, with the 2025-28 term commencing in June 2025. The Board of Directors meets via Zoom the second Thursday of each month at 7 p.m., and each director also leads or serves on one or more committees that meet periodically. The typical time commitment for a director ranges from 5-15 hours per month, depending upon activities and the time of year. Hours volunteered for the Foundation are also counted as program support hours for the Master Gardener Program.

Candidate applications are due March 1

Foundation members will receive an email on Tuesday, February 4 with a link to the candidate application and more detailed information about the Director role. Interested Extension Master Gardeners may also email president@mgfkc.org for the link.

Candidate interviews will be conducted during the month of March, with qualified candidates appearing on a ballot emailed to Foundation members on April 15. Member voting will close on May 15 and election results will be announced on June 1. Newly elected directors will begin their terms at the Foundation Board meeting on June 12. Pruning Your Japanese Maples






Elisabeth C. Miller Library Selection: "The Tree Collectors"
