#### Shorewood Culinary Arts Demonstration Garden Pavers Project





Shorewood Culinary Arts Demonstration Garden Pavers Project

At the Demonstration Garden converting from grass to a paved walkway, would make entering and moving around the garden much easier. This new paved pathway allows students of all abilities to access the Garden for learning and developing life skills, as well as relaxing and socializing. By the end of the summer, with the help of most of the Master Gardener team, the pathway was completed



Renton McLendon Clinic works out of the flagship 11,000 square foot store.

As a team, clinicians became familiar with the content on the store's plant tags. They identified fire resistant species and tried out different ways to discuss them with clients.

They asked clients what if anything they were doing for Wildfire Preparedness, and started conversations sharing planning tips and building community among shoppers.

On August 10, 2024, Renton McLendon reported nearly selling out of one of their fire-resistant plants that clinic had specifically showcased as an ornamental, fire resistant choice.

This kind of relationship building drew together the clinic, their host site and their clients into a community conversation around a program priority.



#### Seed Donation

- Lake Forest Park Ace Hardware donated over \$8000 worth of end-of-season seed packets to the King County Master Gardeners
- Sorted and organized, stored in the Program Office
- Have already been distributed to:
  - Demonstration Gardens
  - School gardens in school districts throughout King County
  - SNAP ED program educators
  - Events and workshops as take-home activities
- Garden, clinic and education leaders will be offered a "storefront" experience to order seeds this spring
