This month's book selection is a delight for multiple reasons. It includes a narrative about reviving a garden, accounts of other gardens and gardeners, and a thread of picking apart the exclusion that can underly gardening.

The subtitle, "In Search of a Common Paradise," refers to the book's underlying theme of unease—do only rich people get to have gardens? Why can't everyone have access to the soul-satisfying pleasure of gardening? Laing argues for a combination of public and private ownership: "We need gardens and the life they support established everywhere, if we are to survive."
