Important Financial Updates

New Sales Tax Implications for Classes, Workshops, and Lectures

We want to let you know about an important change that will affect the cost of our classes.

Beginning October 1, 2025, a new Washington State law (ESSB 5814) requires that all live presentations—including classes, lectures, and workshops—be subject to retail sales tax. This applies to both inperson and virtual programs.

Starting October 1, sales tax will be added to the registration fees for all MGFKC classes, workshops, and lectures.

This law applies to nonprofits across the state. We appreciate your understanding as we adjust.

A Year of Big Impact Wraps Up for New Activities at Kenmore Rhododendron Park


