As CE opportunities come up and everyone prepares for the 2023 season of clinics and demonstration gardens, I want to remind everyone of the hour requirements and the main categories to select in GivePulse. Please enter your hours as soon as possible after completing them, *at minimum*, once per month. For your 2023 hours, you will need to record a minimum of:

- 25 Service Hours and 10 Continuing Education hours (Certified Master Gardeners, AKA Veterans)
- 5 Service Hours and 5 Continuing Education hours (Emeritus Master Gardeners)

Cultivate (More) Knowledge

To Mulch or Not to Mulch: That is the Question

*Or When is Too Much of a Good Thing,
Not a Good Thing?*

It's time to plan and prepare your garden and as knowledgeable Master Gardeners, you know that soil is the key, and the key to good soil is ORGANIC MATTER (hereafter referred to as OM). OM matters because:

- It improves drainage, especially in heavy, compacted soils.
- It helps soils retain moisture and nutrients, especially in sandy soils.
- It slows the release of nutrients like nitrogen, phosphorus and sulfur into the soil.

Micro-organisms in the soil that need nitrogen to grow are what decompose OM, so having too much OM in soils can mean there is a reduced amount of nitrogen available to new and growing plants. In raised beds the soil level declines as the OM decomposes. OM can be added to these beds to maintain the initial soil level. In landscape beds add only an inch a year after the first three years. Give the worms a head start by mixing the OM into the top 6 – 8 inches of the existing soil.

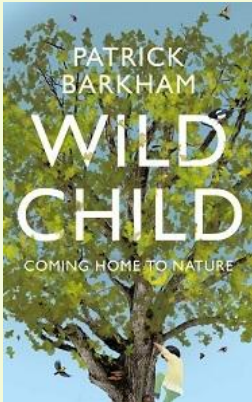
