2021 was an exciting year at our

Magnuson Children's Garden (MCG). Emily Bishton, the MCG Communications Leader, reported that there are two new murals which kids and adult volunteers worked on last summer and fall. They were installed on the double-sided kiosk at the south end of the Children's Garden.

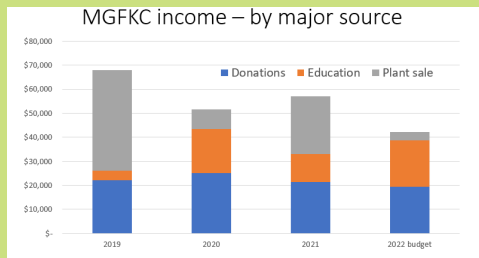
Remembering What it Means to be a Master Gardener

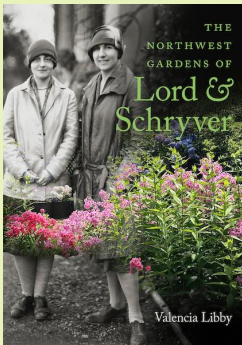

The Northwest Gardens of Lord & Schryver

In her new book, author Valencia Libby details the history of Elizabeth Lord and Edith Schryver. Edith and Elizabeth met as young women studying at the Lowthorpe School of Landscape Architecture for Women in Massachusetts. In 1929, they founded Lord & Schryver, the first Pacific Northwest landscape architecture firm owned and operated by women. Together, they designed more than 200 gardens in Oregon and Washington. This book will appeal to anyone interested in garden design, landscape architecture and Pacific Northwest history. Brian Thompson, Curator of Horticultural Literature, reviewed the book.
